

Upon analysis, it is clear that <u>Covid</u> has had a clear impact upon swimming in general. 26 children in the year 6 (42%) had very little experience of swimming, having not achieved 10 meters of more before the start of the sessions.

By the end of the sessions, which were focused upon the children who had not achieved their 25 meters, this number decreased significantly with 80% of the year achieving 25 meters.

Primary PE and Sport Premium - Key Indicators
